OSCR INQUIRY REPORT INTO BREAKING CHAINS GLOBAL – SCOTTISH CHARITY NUMBER SC048087

An Inquiry Report made under Section 33 of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator, 29 January 2021

Key words: Charity, Scotland, Fundraising, Governance, Remediation

- An Inquiry was launched into Breaking Chains Global (the Charity) following queries from the public concerning fundraising. The Charity is a Scottish Charitable Company formed in 2017 as a private limited company by guarantee without share capital, with use of the 'Limited' exemption. Its purpose is to raise awareness about mental health issues. In 2019, its purposes were amended to include raising awareness about human trafficking and modern slavery.
- 2. The Charity currently has two directors, with two others having resigned in 2019 and 2020 respectively. In 2018 the Charity raised almost £1 million to distribute to various mental health charities. It did so with the involvement of high profile individuals and media interest. However, concerns were subsequently raised with the regulator about how those funds had been spent.
- 3. The Inquiry investigated relevant documentation with the full cooperation of the Charity. The Report highlighted weaknesses in the governance and stewardship of the Charity's assets by the charity trustees. It concluded that the Charity had to better understand:
 - 1. The need for strong, well-documented and transparent decision-making;
 - 2. The need for robust planning of significant fundraising events;
 - 3. The need for strong financial management;
 - 4. The need to consider the reputation of the Charity, particularly where it was linked to high profile individuals and events.
- 4. The Inquiry found that these failings were not deliberate, and given that some issues had already been addressed by the charity trustees, there was no need to go beyond making recommendations, and supporting the Charity to function more appropriately in the future. The Charity will be monitored to ensure compliance with the recommendations made.

IMPLICATIONS

The OSCR took the opportunity to remind charity trustees in Scotland about issues of governance and transparency, including:

- 1. Acting always in the best interests of the charity;
- 2. Considering consequences of decision-making in advance;
- 3. Properly planning major fundraising events;
- 4. Being open and transparent about finances and annual accounts;
- 5. Complying with all necessary legal requirements, especially as they relate to the preparation and external scrutiny of accounts;
- 6. Understanding how to make changes to a charity and when OSCR consent is required for changes to take place.
