### **HOW I HELP MY STUDENTS BUILD CONFIDENCE**

I tutor first-year architecture design students within the School of Design. Tutoring first-year students is both challenging and exciting. You have an incredible responsibility to inspire your students to success and enable them to transition smoothly in the university life by creating a community of learners with a strong sense of belonging.

In design studios, students have to present their work to a larger group of peers which can be a difficult experience for some students at the first-year level. So I aim to build their confidence and capacity to work in groups incrementally. I always guide them to work and present in smaller groups in earlier weeks - from presenting in a group of 4 to a group of 8 and then gradually by week 4 to a group of 16 or more students.

This prepares them for the time required to > build a rapport and relationship with the teacher and fellow learners,

- > get acquainted with the learning setting,
- > and also to understand the learning task and its

objectives.

This approach aligns with my teaching philosophy and involves constantly rethinking what the learning needs are of my students for a particular unit as a cohort, and weaving initiatives and approaches into my teaching practice to accommodate these needs.

Rethinking and innovating teaching and learning initiatives are introduced to sessionals within the academic development workshops offered by the Learning and Teaching Unit at QUT and are a catalyst for positive change among teachers who in turn have a positive impact on the students.

# MY LEARNING & TEACHING JOURNEY AT QUT

Dr. Yulin Liu

I came to QUT in August 2008 to pursue a PhD in transportation engineering. I taught myself a lot about statistics for my PhD research. It was a rewarding but challenging journey for a PhD candidate under all sorts of pressure. Therefore, I have been very keen to share my experience with beginning learners of statistics and people planning to start a PhD.

After transport planning consulting business, I returned to universities as a sessional academic at QUT and UQ in 2014 to 2015, in various disciplines as a demonstrator, tutor, or lecturer.

I believe that statistics is an important skill set for a broad range of disciplines, and I deeply understand how challenging it can be for many students.

With an academic career ambition, I have engaged in a lot of opportunities offered at QUT to develop my teaching capacity. I completed the sessional academic development program – Foundations of Learning and Teaching – offered by QUT Learning and Teaching Unit in 2015. That program facilitated by Ms Michelle Fox really motivated me to seek excellence in everyday teaching at QUT where the quality of learning and teaching is highly valued.

Based on my expertise in introductory statistics education I was proudly recognised as an Associate Fellow of Higher Education Academy (HEA) at the end of 2015, becoming one of the first HEA fellows of QUT. In 2016 I was appointed as Assistant Learning Support

Coordinator in the maths stream of the STIMulate program.

I experimented using numerical simulation to teach sampling distribution in an introductory statistics class and presented my case study at The Ninth Australian Conference on Teaching Statistics.

I further initiated a research proposal with colleagues from Business School and we won a QUT Teaching and Learning Grant to conduct an experimental study in QUT's largest introductory statistics unit, BSB 123 Data Analysis.

Later in 2016, I was invited to present—"Go above and beyond: Passion, research, and effort in teaching a pivotal statistics topic" —

in STARS, - the major celebratory event to recognise and share good practices within the context of sessional teaching at QUT. I really like to share my experience and knowledge with peer sessional academics, particularly those with an international background. I have been proudly appointed as one of Sessional Academic Success (SAS) Advisors in 2017 and 2018 to support



international sessionals by building a community of supportive peers to seek excellence in learning and teaching at QUT. As the initiator, I email international sessional academics on a weekly basis to share information relevant to teaching at QUT. I brand it as "Timely, Short, and Useful Emails".

I believe that learning how to teach is like learning how to cook: understanding fancy recipes does not automatically make you a good cook; it requires an ongoing cycle of theory, practice, and reflection.

Therefore, I like to promote this ongoing learning cycle among international sessional academics.
